

Legislative Report by Charlie Block



The National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) has both good news and not so good news. The five big issues in the bill are:

GOOD NEWS. 2.4% Pay raise for Active Duty personnel. This will reverse the trend in previous years where the pay raises failed to keep up with the Cost of Living increases and fell way behind the private sector.

GOOD NEWS. The Defense Department had proposed changing the Basic Allowance for Housing (BAH) but could not convince Congress. The Defense proposals would have severely cut the allowance that is received by two married service persons.

NOT SO GOOD NEWS. Tricare Pharmacy rates will increase significantly starting in 2018. The cost increase to active duty and retirees will result in a \$22 Billion saving by 2022. The Congress appears to be paying the bills for readiness and modernization of the force on the backs of the active duty and retirees. Not part of the NDAA, but worth noting is that both Tricare Select and Tricare Prime will see significant cost increases starting this year. Yet another bill payer for readiness and modernization.

GOOD NEWS. Active duty end strengths have been increased as follows. Army 7,500; Navy 4,000; Marine Corps 1,000 and Air Force 4,000.

GOOD NEWS. The SBP/DIC offset, referred to as the Widows Tax is no longer in jeopardy of being lost each year. The Congress has made the payments permanent. The payment is still a long way from where it should by, in my opinion, but this is a step in the right direction. MOAA will continue to lobby for increases in the payments.

We are now awaiting a budget so these changes can be implemented. We are now operating on a Continuing Resolution, which is no way to fund the defense of our country. MOAA continues to oppose the limits imposed on the Defense budget by Sequestration and hopefully we will see some changes that will allow increases in the future. The problem is that one side of the isle wants to lift Sequestration to allow increased Defense spending while the other side of the isle insists on like increases in non-defense spending.

SPEAKER (from page 1): For the first time, the adventures of William C. McDonald Jr. are captured in a new book, The Shadow Tiger. The story provides a unique first-hand account of events leading up to and during World War II, based on more than 30,000 pages, letters and photos the aviator shared with friends and family during his 11 years as a pilot both in the United States and in China.

The Shadow Tiger traces McDonald's flying career from its beginning at Maxwell Air Force Base in Montgomery to his time as U.S. Army cadet and wingman in General Claire Chennault's famed aerobatic flying group Three Men on a Flying Trapeze. Much of the book focuses on McDonald's time in China where he worked hand in hand with Chennault to lay the foundation for what would become the Flying Tigers, served as a combat pilot, trained the Chinese Air force, and made hundreds of life saving flights through the Himalayas. Through McDonald's own letters and photographs, readers will experience first-hand adventures

including the Japanese invasion of Hong Kong, a harrowing landing in the middle of the Yangtze River, and countless flights ferrying world-famous passengers and high-value cargo for the China National Aviation Corporation.

Billy is most proud of recently getting the DFC and Air Medal posthumously for his dad. He has spoken to the Montgomery, Fairhope, and Mobile Chapters of MOAA. He has also spoken at the National WWII Museum and the livestream app has the video. His father's papers were requested by the Smithsonian, and he and his wife, Nancy went in August to sign them over, when he spoke and autographed books. As you will see, he and his wife are very passionate about his father's story, and they encourage others to dig up stories and documents to preserve their history.

We will be provided a 20 to 30 minute presentation with time for questions and he also has books that he can autograph. We are sure to be entertained and learn a bit along the way. Go to billy@shadowtiger.org for more information.



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Chaplain's Corner by Ben McKee

This month we have been working with the Veterans organizations and the local churches to bring the movie, "We are Stronger" to Clark

Cinemas in Enterprise. Most of us have heard about Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD), but until I watched the Premier showing by SGM (Ret) Bill Baker with the Pastors of the local area, I did not realize this illness involved others outside the military. This disorder applies to all those first responders: Military, Medical, Police, Firemen, and anyone who has had to live and cope with a significant emotional event in their lives including those within our own families. Most of us have to work through some type of emotional event or events in our lives and there is so much to learn from this dramatic portrayal of a family plagued with this invisible, emotional, physical, and spiritual disturbance I cannot say enough about what I learned from this well produced, plotted, dramatic movie other than to encourage everyone to see it when it returns to the area. After seeing the movie, I attempted to contact as many of you as possible, but I'm sure I missed some. It showed here 19 through 25 January, but it should be showing in nearby areas soon. Please go see it if at all possible. You will be glad you did.

The principle parts of PTSD with which a person must deal is: Physical, Emotional, and Spiritual. The couple in the movie went through all three. Being a Pastor and the Chaplain I will only briefly discuss the Spiritual aspect in this article. There comes a time in most of our lives



when we question God—as to why He allowed something to happen. Vietnam combat was rough on those of us who participated in it, but when I lost all three of my children to death, I definitely questioned God as to WHY! The movie has the: family going through all three aspects of help for PTSD—the Mighty Oaks Retreat for their Spiritual recovery. The Church helped me work through mine. You see, pain shared is pain divided. I learned as did the couple in the movie. that God does not cause terrible things to happen to us—He placed us here and gave us a free will to run our lives. He actually weeps when terrible things happen to His people. Look how He wept; when His friend Lazarus died. Yes, He brought Lazarus back to life but that was for the purpose of showing others that He was the Christ. Lazarus later died like the rest of us will. We must overcome these life wrenching occurrences. and we can with the help of God. He helps us come to grips with self, family, friends, other people, and most of all, with Him. Please, if you have the opportunity, see the movie, "We Are Stronger."

Colonel (Ret.) Herman S. "Stan" Heath, age 75, passed away on January 4, 2018 due to chronic medical conditions. Funeral services were held on Monday, January 8, 2018 in the chapel of Sorrells Funeral Home & Crematory in Enterprise. Burial was with full military honors will follow in Meadowlawn Cemetery. In a career spanning 28 years, including a combat tour in Viet Nam, Stan served in various Army Aviation command and staff positions from company to brigade level. Awards earned during his military career include the Legion of Merit, four Meritorious Service Medals, Bronze Star (with Oak Leaf Cluster), Air Medal (32 awards), Army Commendation Medal with "V" device, and numerous other service medals.
