

TRICARE Costs & Changes

MOAA has successfully prevented lawmakers from including TRICARE For Life fees or other unfair increases as part of the NDAA in recent years. This remains a top legislative priority, as does a push to improve the benefit on two fronts:

Young Adult Coverage—extend TRICARE coverage for young adult dependents, bringing it in line with civilian plans. An amendment addressing the issue was brought up during the Senate NDAA process last year, but it was not included in the final legislation, and

Mental Health Copays—While MOAA will continue to advocate for its passage as a stand alone bill—one that prevents military families and retirees from being priced out of mental health services—sending a message to your lawmakers about this legislation will help it receive more attention as the NDAA wheels begin turning.

Legislative Report

The Military Officer
Association of America
made the best of an ongoing
impossible situation through the use of a
hybrid "Advocacy in Action 2022"
program to contact all 535 congressional
offices. Highlighted in this years program
were the Major Richard Star Act
(H.R.1282 and S. 344) which would allow
combat wounded veterans to receive both
their authorized retirement pay and VA
disability pay (228 co-sponsors in the
House and 58 in the Senate).

The Stop Co-pay Overpay Act HR 4824 would reduce TRICARE mental health co-pays. The Senate has not found an office to introduce a companion act. The military pay raise of 4.6% is far from "in the bank" and even if finally authorized it will be 2.6% behind due to the short fall created during the FY 2014-2016 allotment shortages.

As important as the above issues are there looms a "dragon" on the horizon which will almost relegate these issues to insignificant. The woeful shortfall the military family is living with in their Basic Allowance for Housing allotments is critical and if not quickly rectified will become a major retention issue, not to mention the family health and safety concern. This should not come as a surprise based on the housing market, both rental and ownership, throughout the country.

Representative Marilyn Strickland (D-Wash) has introduced two bills, BAH Restoration Act (H.R. 7561) and BAH Calculation Improvement Act (H.R. 7562) which will hopefully alleviate this concern. The BAH Restoration Act would bring back BAH full coverage as it was until 2015 when DoD reduced BAH one percent per year to a low of 95% by 2019.

COLA Watch: The Consumer Price Index for April was up 6% above the FY 2022 COLA baseline.

ID Card Update: New Deadline for Some Military Retirees, Dependents JULY 18, 2022

Retirees and military family members who have identification cards with no expiration date can choose to upgrade to the new Next Generation Uniform Services Identification, or USID, cards whenever it's convenient -- as long as it's done within the next four years, according to the Defense Department.

There is no looming deadline for use of those old non-active duty cards without expiration dates, but the department expects to completely phase out and replace them with the next-generation IDs, which are more durable and have enhanced security features, by 2026, Maj. Charlie Dietz, a spokesman, told Military.com.

In the meantime, cards with expiration dates are required to be replaced within 90 days of elapsing. The Defense Department began the effort to update all those IDs to the new format in July 2020, but the changeover hit delays caused by the pandemic.

"DoD plans to phase out and cancel the existing card forms in 2026 when all existing cards with an actual expiration date will have expired," Dietz wrote in an email. "After then, only the USID card will be accepted for installation and benefits access."

The USID format for military retirees and dependents represents the first change to those identification cards in nearly 30 years; the last update was in 1993. The new design closely resembles the Common Access Card, or CAC, format issued to active-duty troops and department civilians.

But there was uncertainty among those with cards that list the expiration as indefinite. The IDs are needed to access military facilities and to confirm eligibility for various military benefits, so missing a deadline or losing the identification could disrupt cardholders' lives. Expired cards can be confiscated at base gates.

Those with cards with no expiration dates "may have the card replaced at their convenience," according to Dietz. The department recommends they go to the ID Card Office Online and use the office locator to find a site that issues the new cards and book an appointment.

Retirees and their dependents, dependents of active-duty troops, reserve members and Medal of Honor recipients are among those who will receive the USID cards.


